A Crummey Trust is a colloquial term used to describe any trust with a demand right by the beneficiary to presently access the gift made to the trust.

Adding Crummey powers to an irrevocable trust provides the opportunity to make gifts to a trust that will provide a future benefit while qualifying for a present exemption.

Funding Update

MD 529 Plans

If you have 529 plans for your college bound loved ones, you have options to fund these plans to your trust. The ownership can be transferred to your trust, or your trust can be named as a successor owner. Each of these options avoids probate at your death. Before changing ownership to your trust, it's best to check to see if any electronic transfers associated with the plan may be disrupted with an ownership change. In that event, naming your trust as the successor owner would be the path to take to fund the plan to your trust.
